





It is not tradition, activities or a curriculum that changes lives - but people who have genuine love for young people and are willing to invest time and energy in them.



- To create a timeless and classic design that will still look modern and good even for years to come.
- A design with good wearability comfortable, practical and easy to maintain.

Describe the design, and now that it's done, what do you love about it?

A 2-piece ensemble - an elegant white top with a pair of dark navy culottes.

The top is accented with a special neckline, seam line details and a white-on-white embroidery of the letterings "GB". The fabric we've chosen is a blend of Tencel and cotton, which gives it natural breathability and softness to the touch.

As for the bottoms, it is designed with parallel seam lines to match those on the top, as well as an elastic waistband for a better fit. Made in a medium-weight stretchy fabric for a good overall form and drape.

I love its simplicity and practicality along with the subtle design details.

REACHING FRIENDS IN NEED ISLAND-WIDE

With the help of 250 members of the public. The Girls' Brigade Singapore fulfilled 3,000 wishes capped at \$60 each for vulnerable residents living island-wide, building on the previous year's focus on residents living in the West.

This GBFD marked a special first as GB Girls with mild mental disabilities delivered the very first GBFD wishes alongside their counterparts, proving that Every Girl can make a positive difference to someone else.

Since 2011, the Girls' Brigade Friend in Deed project has served more than 18,000 beneficiaries. It is part of the Girls' Brigade's annual commitment to connect with the public to help the disadvantaged within the community, including vulnerable children, elderly and adults living alone.

The GBFD evolved into a wish fulfilment project from its previous format as a community carnival.






THE YEAR AHEAD

GB FOR ALL ONLINE TRAINING MODULES

GBS will launch the first of our GB for All online volunteer training modules. Developed in partnership with Ark, a social enterprise that provides evidence-based intervention for children, the first module is specially tailored to help volunteers create an inclusive environment for Girls with Special Educational Needs within their GB Companies. Unlike teachers, parents and caregivers, volunteers only get to meet Girls once a week and would need specific skills they can easily and repeatedly use.

INTEGRATED VOLUNTEER MANAGEMENT, MEMBER AND UNIT MANAGEMENT SYSTEM

Part of our Digital Strategy Plan to streamline the support and highly administrative functions of the Brigade. This will help reduce the repetitive work of staff members so they can focus on continual improvement to reduce the administrative load on our front line volunteers.

The new system will also help volunteers manage units more efficiently - freeing them from as much administrative work as possible so they can focus on establishing their Company and their own personal well-being.

NEW PROGRAMME, RESOURCES AND VOLUNTEER TRAINING EXPERIENCE

Started in 2021, the development of a new GB programme, curriculum and badges is underway and currently in pilot use across all our Companies. The new curriculum is accompanied by new resources for Girls and volunteers that are focused on:

- Building a simpler, unified experience for Girl development
- Consistent training of volunteers to deliver the 4-fold programme
- Providing clear guidance for volunteers with room for flexibility
- Providing ideas and opportunities for Girls to lead

HOMELESSNESS FORUM: YOUTH EDITION

Organised in partnership with the New Hope Community Services, the Homelessness Learning Forum: Youth Edition (HLF: YE) is a platform for deeper conversations on homelessness amongst youth, moving towards practical action. After the successful first edition, GB Singapore will continue to build the forum with New Hope Community Services this year. The forum hopes to achieve the following three key objectives:

- Raise awareness of homelessness amongst youth
- Humanise homelessness and evoke empathy
- Provide handles on navigating life's challenges while growing up.

GB FRIEND IN DEED (GBFD) 2023

GBFD will continue to rally Singaporeans to grant the wishes of vulnerable Singaporeans in 2023. The project will partner more SG CARES Volunteer Centres and South West CDC (SWCDC) to reach and enable more Social Service Agencies do something extra special for their beneficiaries.

In partnership with South West CDC(SWCDC), GB Girls from Primary and Secondary schools will also create and furnish customised reading and study spaces for 30 special households in SWCDC.

Together with local artisan woodworkers, Roger &Sons, our Girls will fabricate, assemble and deliver sustainable, right-sized furniture - giving a second-life to local trees which have been felled for urban development.



GOVERNANCE

BOARD COMPOSITION, SELECTION AND EVALUATION

GBS is governed by a Board whose members are elected biannually according to the Constitution with the aid of a Nominations Committee. The voting members of the General Meeting are known as the Council. The Board comprises:

- · The President
- · Up to two Vice Presidents
- · Secretary
- · Assistant Secretary
- ·Treasurer
- · Up to eight ordinary board members

Each brings with them skills and abilities in diverse areas such as finance, accounting, audit, business and management, human resource, technology, fundraising, and legal. Together with the Executive Director (ED) the Board charts the strategic involvement of the organisation and ensures that we run well and responsibly.

Board Members do not receive any remuneration for their involvement. No Board member holds a staff appointment. The Executive Director is an ex-officio member who has the right to attend all Board and Board Committee meetings but does not vote on the Board's decisions.

Except for the Treasurer, all members serve a term of 2 years for a maximum of 10 consecutive years. The term of office for the Treasurer shall not be more than four (4) consecutive years. Thereafter, reappointment to the Treasurer position can be considered after a lapse of at least two (2) years.

All current Board Members have not reached their maximum term of service.

SELECTION AND EVALUATION

All incoming Board members are recommended a list of training lessons to attend, given an orientation to GBS, and provided a handbook that states their roles, responsibilities, and the spirit in which they are to perform their duties.

The Nominations Committee is responsible for selecting Board Members based on the final composition of the board which would fulfil the following:

- Specific governance skill-sets
- Sector experience
- Diversity e.g. age, organisational passion etc.

Once every two years, board members are required to fill in a Board Evaluation Checklist and self-reflection sheet.

The Board must meet at least 4 times a year and met seven times (including the AGM in 2022).

BOARD COMMITTEES

The Board has five Board Committees that look into specific key areas to ensure that matters are given the right support, resources and fiduciary guidance.

AUDIT COMMITTEE

The Audit Committee facilitates external and internal audits for the Board to obtain independent information about the organisation's activities. The committee also assists to put in place the internal audit plan for the organisation.

NOMINATIONS COMMITTEE

The Nominations Committee is responsible for selecting Board Members based on the final composition of the board which would fulfil the following:

- · Specific governance skill-sets
- · Sector experience
- · Diversity e.g. age, organisational passion etc.

FINANCE COMMITTEE

The Finance Committee assists the Board of The Girls' Brigade Singapore in fulfilling the Board's responsibilities to oversee the management of all fund investment activities of GBS, and to provide advice to the Board on such matters.

STAFF COMMITTEE

The Staff Management Committee manages all Human Resource and Development matters, ensuring that HR systems and resources remain effective and current to industry practices.

PROGRAMMES AND SERVICES COMMITTEE

The Programme and Services Committee reviews new initiatives or programmes, ensure that new and existing services are well resourced with outcomes are aligned with GBS' mission and strategic plans, and limitations stipulated by funders where applicable.

BB/GB CAMPSITE MANAGEMENT COMMITTEE

The BB/GB Campsite Management committee develops and implements policies governing the usage and maintenance of the BB/GB Campsite at 1200 Sembawang Road.

FINANCIAL MANAGEMENT AND INTERNAL CONTROLS

In keeping with good governance and transparency The Girls' Brigade Singapore has in place documented procedures for key financial areas including and not limited to our system for delegation of authority and limits of approval, payment procedures and controls, procurement procedures and controls, as well as receipting.

Planned timing of use for restricted or endowment funds

The Girls' Brigade Singapore does not have a planned timing of use for its restricted or endowment funds. Disclosure of timed planning of use is made in our audited reports only when donors or grant makers have specified a timeline for use of these funds.

Purpose of Restricted / Endowment Funds

GBS discloses its restricted funds in its Audited Financial Statements (Pg 6 of FY21 Financial Statements.) We do not have endowment funds according to the Charity Portal.

Risk Management and Internal Audit

Under the Singapore Code of Governance for Charities and Institutions of a Public Character ("Code of Governance for Charities & IPCs") updated in 2017, the Board is responsible for the governance of risk and ensures that Management maintains a sound system of risk management and internal controls, to safeguard the interests of the organisation and its stakeholders.

In addition, the Audit Committee is responsible for reviewing at least annually the adequacy and effectiveness of the organisation's internal controls and risk management systems. Girls' Brigade Singapore requires internal audits to be carried out throughout the organisation for purposes of assessing the overall effectiveness of the governance, risk and control frameworks of the organisation, and carries out an internal audit of selected key areas over a three-year cycle, covering:

- · IT/Data/Cyber Security
- · Corporate Governance & Compliance
- · Income & Receipts
- · Procurement & payments
- · Human resources and payroll
- · Fixed Assets
- · Personal Data Protection
- · Enterprise Risk overview

- GBS does not make any loans to any employees, management, Board members, or any related parties or third parties.

Our Policies

Reserves Policy

GBS will endeavour to maintain a level of reserves which is at least equivalent to 12 months of annual operating expenses. The growth of reserves ensures the long-term financial sustainability of the organisation and its work, allowing GBS to weather against income fluctuations as well as to respond to costly and unpredictable situations beyond the control of GBS.

Reserves will be held in accounts with the approval of the Board and in accordance with other guiding policies set out by the Board.

Management will inform the Treasurer/Assistant Treasurer, at least three months before the cashflow is expected to breach the threshold of 12 months of operating expenses.

Conflict of Interest Policy

The Girls' Brigade Singapore has in place a Conflict of Interest (COI) Policy which all incoming staff & Board Members are required to endorse and align with.

This involves avoiding conflicts of interest between the interests of the Girls' Brigade, and personal, professional, and business interests.

Privacy Policy

The Girls' Brigade Singapore has in place a Privacy Policy covering data protection of all information we receive. We regard the privacy of our member's personal data with utmost importance and are committed to comply with the Personal Data Protection Act of 2012 (PDPA).
